Swapping face-to-face team meetings for video calls, using instant messaging in place of quick questions in the office, we soon adapted. And after nearly two weeks it started to become the norm.

Lots happened in those two weeks and the weeks before lockdown; Government announced various support measures for businesses and individuals, including grants, job retention schemes and mortgage payment holidays, and, we, YOUR local Chamber launched our #StrongerTogether initiative, showing the importance of clubbing together and against the odds supporting each other as a local community, as friends in business.

#### Our #StrongerTogether initiative forms: Supplying you, our members with up-to-date information

Our Coronavirus Advice Hub - a dedicated hub of information on the Lincolnshire Chamber of Commerce website to help our members access the most up-to-date and relevant information relating to COVID-19, which continued to be updated daily (if not hourly) with new Government guidelines, updates on support schemes, latest news, information and much more.

#### Local voice having national impact

Lobbying and representing your voice, locally and nationally showed its importance and continually highlighted our #StrongerTogether message.

We raised local issues nationally through BCC, as an example we have had things around essential businesses, Small Business Grant Fund, issues with funding and CBILS - showing a cumulative local voice has maximum national impact.

Weekly calls with our partners, locally and daily calls, nationally, with British Chambers of Commerce and the wider UK Chambers, sharing ideas, support and best practices, showing a unified approach across our network. March 23, 2020, the commencement of UK lockdown, businesses forced to close, people told to stay at home, the day that impacted our everyday life (working and personal) so deeply. A day we'd never forget.

### Adapting our events to suit a virtual world

With events, training and seminars a significant part of our membership offering, we had to adapt quickly to suit the needs of our members....and ChamberConnect was born - a series of interactive virtual events which supports businesses and their staff through the Coronavirus Crisis.

We welcomed experts from; Greater Lincolnshire LEP, Wilkin Chapman, Duncan & Toplis, the British Business Bank, Carrington Communications and local councils covering topics surrounding; government grants, furlough working and the Job Retention Scheme, managing cash flow, mental wellbeing and much more.

#### No disruption to International Trade documentation

For a lot of essential businesses across Lincolnshire, our export documentation



service plays a vital role in their supply chain and whilst we have all been operating as 'business as usual' to some extent, but with remote working we have been working in a slightly different way to that of the norm, and it was imperative for us to ensure there is no reduction in our documentation services. And through connections from British Chambers of Commerce the transition to a different way of working was made simpler with some countries that had previously required inked stamps, temporarily offering electronic stamps during a period of crisis.

### Gaining 'on the ground' business intelligence

Talking to, supporting, signposting and guiding our members, understanding the challenges they are seeing or likely to see in the future and continually using this to inform local and national Government.

### Business minister opens new engineering centre at Boston College

The Business Minister Nadhim Zahawi MP opened the Engineering, Manufacturing and Technology Centre (EMAT) at Boston College in March

The new £4.3 million state-of-the-art centre was developed with funding from the Greater Lincolnshire Skills Capital Investment Programme (administered by the Greater Lincolnshire LEP) and the Midlands Engine.

It provides an industry-driven training facility that will stimulate growth and productivity across the sector with its innovative workshops and suites.

Acting as a hub for local engineering and manufacturing, the centre offers the opportunity for agritech businesses to create a partnership with the college to help train the engineers in line with industry needs.

EMAT includes an innovative hub, two workshops that will provide



space for traditional engineering and manufacturing skills and modern industry practices, an electronics laboratory, a Computer Aided Design and Manufacture (CAD/CAM) suite, three classrooms and a break-out space.

Mr Zahawi was taken on a guided tour of the facility, where he talked to learners who are currently training to become engineers of the future, before officially opening the centre. "The new facility at Boston College brings together some of the UK's finest academics, students and local businesses, all of whom will be instrumental to helping us realise the UK's engineering and manufacturing potential," he said.

"By boosting crucial skills and fuelling local growth, this state-of-the-art building will help our local agriculture and manufacturing businesses stay at the forefront of the technology revolution." Other guests at the opening included Matt Warman MP, Mayor of Boston Councillor Anton Dani, Councillor Paul Skinner, Pat Doody (LEP Chair) and Ruth Carver (LEP Chief Executive) as well as Boston College governors, local employers and school representatives.

"The EMAT Centre forms part of the LEP's £7.34m Skills Capital Investment Fund Programme, which aims to strengthen our local training infrastructure to respond more effectively to business needs and enable employers to upskill their existing workforce or attract relevant skills locally," said Pat Doody.

"Our £2.8m grant will support key strategic sectors and invigorate and support innovation for businesses, stimulating economic growth through access to resources and advice.

"As one of the key sites making up the emerging Lincolnshire Institute for Technology, the EMAT Centre will undoubtedly help our young people achieve their ambitions and realise their full potential."

Boston College Principal and Chief Executive Jo Maher added: "We are honoured that Mr Zahawi has opened our brand new EMAT centre and we're extremely grateful for the support and funding provided by the LEP.

## Melvyn Prior links LIVES and local gin distillery Pin Gin, to make life-saving alcohol sanitiser

LIVES First Responders went live on BBC Radio Lincolnshire with Melvyn Prior, to appeal for hand sanitisers for their lifesaving volunteers.

The 700-strong group of volunteers attend 999 calls in and around their communities – often arriving well before paramedics can.

Turning to their BBC local radio station in a time of need, they put the call out for sanitiser.

And within no time, Pin Gin, a local distillery based in Louth, answered their call for help, managing to produce the alcohol needed.

Martin Slack, News Editor at the station comments, "We knew a local gin distillery had recently started producing hand sanitiser because the owners knew there was a shortage. So we called the distillery and asked if they could help. They said yes and agreed to come on air and make the offer to the charity live on the programme." Gemma Shaw from LIVES comments, "Being able to go on BBC Radio Lincolnshire and ask for help has

allowed us to get our wheels going again – it is really amazing. Medical emergencies don't stop and this means our First Responders are still there supporting our colleagues in the NHS. People like Amy mean the world to us – so we can keep going."

Amy Conyard from Pin Gin said: "We know it can be a matter of life and death. Melvyn Prior invited me onto his show last week to speak with Nikki - the CEO of LIVES – and after that it was obvious we needed to get it out to their teams.

"From the first batch we've managed to get 25 litres down to the LIVES team – so that can go straight out for the First Responders who don't have any at the moment."



## Lincolnshire Action Trust welcomes new chair

After 19 years at the helm Sheridan Minshull has retired from Lincolnshire Action Trust's Board of Management, making way for new Chair Jo Mead.

Sheridan became Chair of the charity, which supports people in the criminal justice system with everything from health and well-being to accommodation and finance, in 2001 after having been Lincolnshire's Chief Probation Officer for 15 years.

He has worked closely with Lincolnshire Action Trust's Chief Executive Alison Goddard to oversee the running of the charity, including a merger with families' drug and alcohol support service Oasis in 2015 – which later became Young Oasis.

During Sheridan's time as Chair, the trust also established the country's first Departure Lounge at HMP Lincoln which provides a temporary safe space for people when they've been released from prison.

"It has been a privilege to serve in the role of Chair of LAT and to support our skilled and dedicated staff and volunteers in their work to help those whose problems have brought them into contact with the criminal justice system over the last 19 years," said Sheridan.

"LAT was founded to continue the partnership work between the statutory and voluntary sectors started in the county when I was Chief Probation Officer between 1986 and 2001.

"It has since grown and developed to become a widely respected and valued organisation in the field of rehabilitation and family support.

"I am confident that it will continue to grow and prosper in the capable hands of my successor Jo Mead, the other trustees and the team ably led by Chief Executive Alison Goddard."

Taking on the role of Chair was a natural

progression for Jo, who has known of LAT since it was set up in 2000 and has signposted people to its services.

Jo's background is in probation and adult social care and, until four years ago, she was Chief Executive of Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Nottinghamshire and Rutland Community Rehabilitation Company.

"I'm excited to have joined LAT as Chair of the Board," said Jo. "During my time as a Chief Executive, I learned a lot about the

## Lincoln UTC student engineers protective equipment for NHS

Sixteen-year-old UTC student, Jonty Horn, responded to requests for Personal Protection Equipment (PPE) for frontline NHS staff by utilising 3D printing to manufacture face shields in his own home.

Jonty has studied a STEM based curriculum of GCSEs at Lincoln UTC, a specialist college for science and engineering, for the past two years. The current nationwide shortage of PPE prompted the Year 11 student to put his engineering skills into practise by finding a solution to the problem.

Initially Jonty accessed files to create the shields using Creality 3D printing technology and produced his first prototypes, a lightweight and heavyduty version of the clear protective face shield. He then approached Lincoln County Hospital, St Barnabas Hospice and his local doctor's surgery to offer the shields to their staff free of charge.

Jonty said: "Having experience with 3D printing and seeing the current challenges faced by the NHS I decided now would be an ideal time to help them by aiding in the production of face masks for COVID-19 PPE.

Once I explained that there was absolutely no cost to them, the nurses were overjoyed! They asked me to continue production of the heavy-duty version and I started straight away."

Jonty's father, Chris Horn, Service Engineer for Ceratizit UK & Ireland's Tool-o-Mat said: "3D printing the holder for the plastic face shield takes around two hours on Jonty's Creality printer so we can only make so many.

However, the beauty of 3D printing is that the files can be shared so easily, and if more people with access to 3D printing get involved we can really make a difference for our key workers in the NHS in the fight against Coronavirus."

John Morrison, Principal of Lincoln UTC said: "It's fantastic to see one our students taking the initiative and using his experience in engineering to help others in a time of crisis. Lincoln UTC fosters innovation and I am so proud to see Jonty using his technical skills and enterprising spirit for such a worthwhile cause."
