#### East Midlands businesses claim £355m for innovation

EAST Midlands businesses claimed £355 million in research and development (R&D) tax credits for the 19/20 financial year, according to HMRC's latest R&D tax relief report, with the average claim being worth £64.000.

There was a total of 5,510 claims, a number that will continue to grow as 19/20 years remain open for claims until March 2022.

According to the report, the sectors where the highest number of R&D claims across the UK were made are Information and Communication (22%), Manufacturing (22%) and Professional, Scientific and Technical (19%) sectors, accounting for 20%, 25% and 24% of the total amount

claimed, respectively. Leslie Maloney, tax specialist at R&D tax specialists Access2Funding, said: "The uplift in the number of R&D tax relief claims in the East Midlands represents an increasing awareness of HMRC's tax relief scheme and increasing innovation within the region, which is wonderful to see.

'l personally believe this report shows opportunity for real growth for innovative businesses in the East Midlands, particularly in those high growth sectors and a shift towards the new economy.

"The more traditional sectors like Manufacturing and Construction have been claiming R&D for many years and we expect this to continue but for Professional, Scientific and Technical and Information and Communication to be the main drivers of growth in helping the country to recover economically. This will be reflected in 2022's report.

R&D tax credits are an HMRC incentive to encourage UK businesses to continue to grow by innovating. The incentive eing a reduction in corporation tax or a cash payment.

# Begbies Traynor: 'Firms show signs of bouncing back'

### BENEFITING FROM THE EASING OF RESTRICTIONS

THE number of financially struggling businesses in Lincolnshire region and across the UK economy fell sharply in the third quarter of this year compared to Q2 as a result of the relaxation of Covid regulations this summer, according to the latest Red Flag Alert data, published by leading independent business colnshire and across the rescue and recovery specialist Begbies Traynor.

The figures for three months to September 2021 showed a 14 per cent decline in the number of distressed businesses in Lincolnshire compared to the previous quarter.

However, there had been only a 2 per cent year-on-year decline in the number of distressed companies, in comparison with Q3 last year before the second national lockdown was imposed in November.

The new data reveals that a total of 5.900 Lincolnshire firms were displaying symptoms of early-stage or "significant" financial distress in the three months to September, down from 6,800 businesses at the end of June this year.

Significant distress refers to companies that have financial problems such as having minor county court judgements of less than £5,000 filed against them.

The UK as a whole saw a 14 per cent drop in significant distress compared to the previous quarter,

and a 1 per cent increase year on year.

Gareth Rusling, who heads Begbies Traynor's Lincolnshire offices, said: "It's encouraging to see levels of distress falling since the previous quarter, showing that many businesses in Lincountry are benefiting from the easing of Covid restrictions.


"However, the multiple challenges of soaring prices and the ongoing scarcity of raw materials, combined with chronic labour and skills shortages, is weighing heavily on businesses across many sectors.

Add to this the pressures of escalating fuel costs,

severe shortages of lorry drivers and the ensuing supply chain disruption, and it's clear this is very rapidly becoming a perfect storm for many businesses.

"At a time when government support measures are being withdrawn and many businesses are also having to face up to paying back loans, there are going to be some tough times ahead."

He added: "While we all hope post-pandemic economic recovery is on the cards, the worry is that too many small businesses will go under before the Government

#### Mission to tackle domestic abuse

Supporting Domestic Abuse Awareness takes place on Saturday November 27, from 10am to 2.30pm. It will explore various forms of abuse, highlight ways of recognising these and discuss what can be done to prevent injury and save lives

NWCH CIC chief executive Naomi Watkins-Ligudzinska said this topic has never been more important. During the first seven weeks of lockdown domestic abuse cases rose by 100 per cent. Every week women and men still die at the hands of abusive partners.

'This issue needs an urgent response. It has reached crisis proportions and domestic violence has the power to destroy whole families," said Naomi.

"Covid has made matters worse, by keeping domestic violence firmly hidden behind closed doors. We believe health professionals and businesses, particularly hair and beauty salons, massage centres and nail technicians, where customers tend to chat freely - will find this event helpful."

Domestic abuse advocates and international keynote speakers, brothers Luke and Ryan Hart's father devastatingly shot dead their mother and sister in Spalding. Luke is the conference's headline speaker.

Abuse survivor, and now successful businesswoman, Dani Wallace is living proof there is hope for better times in the wake of abuse. Lori Busch from the charity ManKind will share how men are the forgotten victims of domestic abuse.

# New Ownership boosts Larkfleet Growth Plans


LARKFLEET Group's ambitious growth plans have taken a step forward with the

LINCOLNSHIRE Co-op has recorded a positive trading year, with its varied mix of businesses helping it stay resilient during the ongoing challenges.

The society has also collaborated locally on major initiatives, including the Covid-19 vaccination programme and the creation of Lincolnshire's first food redistribution hub.

Overall sales rose 5.8 per cent to £355m in the 2020/21 financial year (ending September 4th 2021) with food sales continuing to grow, going up by 4.8 per cent.

Food stores feature the Love Local range, sourced from 45 producers from the area, and sales were worth  $\pounds$ 3.3m.

In pharmacies, the expert teams dispensed 5.7m prescriptions and provided a host of other NHS services, including issuing lateral flow test kits.

The society's travel branches bore the brunt of the pandemic's effect, but customer numbers are increasing with many travellers wanting the expertise and security of booking with a travel agent.

To keep investment in the area and boost the economy, Lincolnshire Co-op works with local contractors and suppliers on capital projects.

This year, these have included new food stores, as well as property developments such as the Lincoln Science and Innovation Park and the city's Cornhill Quarter.

£10m was spent with local businesses on capital projects this year.

Two lockdowns and regularly changing restrictions meant

Lincolnshire Co-op's 2,870 colleagues faced new challenges. In April, each was given a Colleague of the Year award and £50 to treat themselves. £1.9m dividend has been paid out to Lincolnshire Co-op members this year.

Members attending the Society's meetings in November and December will be asked to approve a bonus of 85p per £1 collected during the year, a further £1.6m.


This year, the society appointed its first Chair, David Cowell. It is also currently running a Board of Directors election, which includes online voting for the first time.

The Society's Community Champions fundraising scheme raised £648,684 for 586 local charities and community groups, including for defibrillators and first responder charities. Lincolnshire's first food redistribution hub, a pioneering project which will divert surplus food to organisations fighting food poverty, was set up in Lincoln by charity FareShare East Midlands.

Unsold products are collected from suppliers and retailers, including 21 Lincolnshire Co-op food stores, taken to the Lincoln hub and shared between organisations – like food banks and community cafés – that use it to support people in need in Lincoln, East Lindsey and North East Lincolnshire.

Lincolnshire Co-op's Chief Executive Ursula Lidbetter said: "From helping to deliver the national NHS Covid-19 vaccination programme to providing employment opportunities and supporting groups tackling food poverty, I'm proud of what we've achieved.

"My colleagues have continued their outstanding efforts to provide our valued services to local communities and I thank them all."

### New work programme with new partnership

BOSTON Borough Council has outlined its ambitious new plans and areas of focus, aimed at increasing outcomes for residents and businesses across the Borough.

In a report due to be discussed by the Council, councillors are to consider a programme of work both for the newly formed South & East Lincolnshire Councils Partnership (S&ELCP), and for Boston Borough specifically, that centres on economic growth, regeneration, housing and health and wellbeing. Plans for Boston include

Plans for Boston include delivery of the projects through the Towns Fund programme, working with partners on the expansion of Boston Port, the continued delivery of the Empowering Healthy Communities programme, and the rollout of government's Green Homes funding.

Residents will also benefit from improvements to the Council's digital channels, making accessing Council services easier and more efficient, and investment in changing places and public conveniences.

The Partnership-wide plans include developing the case for Devolution for the sub-region, working with Central Government as part of its Levelling Up agenda (which includes funding for education, skills and housing), a co-ordinated approach to the Government's Environmental Bill, and a focus on health and leisure. Plans also include a joint approach to Internal Drainage Boards.

The report also reaffirms the Partnership's business case that  $\pounds$ 42m of savings could be made over the ten years if all opportunities to share council services are embraced. The Councils have already realised  $\pounds$ 4.5m of that saving through a shared Corporate Management Team, which has been in place since the beginning of October.

Councillor Paul Skinner, Leader of Boston Borough Council, said: "Our Partnership with East Lindsey and South Holland provides us with the opportunity to deliver real, transformational change for our patch and undertaking this forward-thinking work programme will be our first step towards doing just that."
